





First-Time Bus Applicants of Section 5307 Funding Fact Sheet

Overview

The Public Transportation Agency Safety Plan (PTASP) regulation (49 CFR Part 673) requires applicable recipients and States to develop Agency Safety Plans (ASP) that include and implement Safety Management Systems (SMS) processes and procedures. The PTASP regulation applies to all recipients and subrecipients of <u>Urbanized Area Formula Grant Program</u> funds under 49 U.S.C. Section 5307, including bus, multi-modal, and rail transit agencies.¹

Part 673 Applicability

To be eligible for an Urbanized Area Formula Grant (Section 5307), transit providers **must comply with the PTASP regulation by developing an ASP.** Agencies must certify compliance with the PTASP regulation before receiving funds from FTA. To certify compliance, agencies go to the Certifications and Assurances page in the <u>Transit Award Management System</u> (TrAMS) and select "Category 2, Public Transportation Agency Safety Plan."

States are required to develop ASPs for their small public transportation providers unless a small provider opts to draft its own plan (see the <u>Guide to "Opting Out"</u>). In either case, the small provider must implement the safety plan and update it as needed.

A small public transportation provider operates 100 or fewer vehicles in peak revenue service across all non-rail

fixed-route modes or in any one non-fixed-route mode and does not operate rail fixed guideway (§ 673.5).

Where to Start

You can start by visiting the <u>PTASP Technical Assistance Center (TAC)</u>. FTA established the TAC to help applicable recipients and subrecipients meet PTASP regulation requirements. The TAC includes resource libraries for <u>small bus</u>, <u>bus</u>, and <u>rail</u> transit providers, as well as for <u>State Departments of Transportation</u> (DOTs), <u>State Safety Oversight Agencies</u>, and <u>Metropolitan Planning Organizations</u>.
