Question 2:

What resources are available to help agencies develop their emergency preparedness and response plans?

FTA Response:

FTA has worked with the American Public Transportation Association to develop voluntary standards and recommended practices that focus on emergency procedures, such as:

- [Rail Transit Agency Emergency Management Requirements](#)
- [Transit Incident Drills and Exercises](#)
- [Emergency Communication Strategies for Transit Agencies](#)

FTA also offers the **Effectively Managing Transit Emergencies** course through [TSI](#).

Per [§ 673.11\(a\)\(6\)](#), each emergency preparedness and response plan should address, at a minimum:

- Assignment of employee responsibilities, as necessary and appropriate, during an emergency;
- Integration of responses to all hazards, as appropriate; and
- Processes for coordination with Federal, State, Regional, and local officials with roles and responsibilities for emergency preparedness and response in the transit agency's service area.

Question 3:

Our agency is currently reviewing and updating our ASP. Which sections of the ASP should we expect to update?

FTA Response:

Agencies will update their ASPs based on their specific circumstances. Some examples of items to review and update include the following (note, this list is NOT exhaustive):

- Processes that no longer reflect the agency's operating reality;
- System characteristics that have changed in a way that may impact the content or language of the ASP;
- New or modified SMS processes, policies, or procedures;
- Safety Performance Targets that may need to be updated; and
- Changes made due to continuous improvement activities.

Note that rail transit agencies must make sure their processes align with their State Safety Oversight Agency Program Standard requirements.
