PTASP Compliance

- 100% of applicable transit agencies and States now have Agency Safety Plans (ASPs)
- To support the industry in meeting the certification deadline, the PTASP Technical Assistance Center (TAC) provided:
 - Over 400 voluntary ASP reviews
 - Responses to over 1,700 questions from transit agencies, State Safety Oversight agencies (SSOAs), State Departments of Transportation, Metropolitan Planning Organizations, and other impacted groups
 - Monthly webinars and workshops
 - Technical assistance resources and sample ASPs
 - Direct one-on-one technical assistance



PTASP Certification Process: Who Must Certify Compliance?

- Direct recipients of Urbanized Area Formula Grants Program (49 U.S.C. Section 5307) funding from July 20, 2020, or later
- Rail transit agencies (RTAs) in the State Safety Oversight (SSO) Program (Part 674)
- States with small public transportation providers receiving 5307 funding
- Newly Applicable Agencies
 - Agencies must develop an ASP and meet all other PTASP regulation requirements
 - Agencies must certify compliance in Transit Award Management System (TrAMS)

PTASP Certification Process: How do Agencies Maintain Compliance?

- Annual certification for recipients and States
- Annual agency PTASP review, though 49 CFR Part 673 (Part 673) it does not require agencies to update their ASPs annually
- SSOAs may require rail transit agencies under their jurisdiction to complete an annual ASP update
- FTA triennial oversight review of Part 673 requirements

PTSCTP Requirements

- Initially, training requirements for Public Transportation Safety Certification Training Program (PTSCTP): August 21, 2021, or within three years of enrolling into the program
 - Notice of Enforcement Discretion for PTSCTP: New target date
 <u>August 21, 2022</u>
- Complete refresher training every two years
- An SSOA or RTA must identify required refresher training for individuals (staff and/or contractors) designated by the agency
 - Minimum of one hour of safety oversight training
- SSOAs and RTAs must certify compliance


Vaccine Access Outreach

Eligibility of CARES Act, CRRSAA and ARP funds includes vaccine access services, such as:

- Free or reduced-fare rides to COVID-19 vaccinations, and
- Providing use of transit facilities or vehicles for vaccination sites.

Transit agencies incentive examples for employee vaccinations include:

- Paid time off
- Cash Awards
- Gift Cards

TSA Federal Mask Requirement Updates

- The Transportation Security Administration (TSA) has extended the face mask requirement through <u>March 18, 2022</u>.
- Range of penalties remains:
 - \$500-\$1,000 for first offenders and
 - \$1,000-\$3,000 for second offenders.

Bipartisan Infrastructure Law

- ✓ Enhances State Safety Oversight (SSO) programs by strengthening rail inspection practices.
- ✓ Enhances practices related to:
 - o the development of transit agency safety plans,
 - o improving safety training,
 - \circ $\,$ reducing assaults on vehicle operators, and
 - instituting measures to reduce vehicular and pedestrian accidents involving buses.
- ✓ Increases the set-aside for SSO grants from 0.5 percent to 0.75 percent, equaling approximately \$251 million over 5 years.
- Requires additional content be added to the National Public Transportation Safety Plan.
- Require agency safety plans to be consistent with CDC and State health authority guidelines to minimize exposure to infectious diseases.
