### **TRACS Role**

TRACS provides research, analysis, and recommendations to the U.S. Secretary of Transportation and the FTA Administrator on *matters relating to the safety of public transportation* 

The FTA Administrator and the DFO work together to assign TRACS with taskings relating to the safety of U.S. public transportation systems

TRACS completes their research and analysis and provides recommendations for the *U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT)*and FTA, not for the industry at large

3

FTA's goal is to compile research, analysis, and recommendations into one report per year for each task

### **Voting Procedures and Meeting Requirements**

#### **Voting Procedures**

- TRACS members approve proposed recommendations to FTA via a group vote.
- The TRACS Chairperson or Vice Chairperson will raise the motion to vote. Any member may second the vote.
- A majority of members must vote in favor of a proposed recommendation before it is formally presented to FTA.

#### **Meeting Requirements**

- A quorum of two-thirds of the members is required to hold full-committee meetings.
- The Chairperson or Vice Chairperson must be present at full-committee meetings.

# **TRACS Tasking**

### **Task Criteria**

While researching the topics and developing recommendations for FTA and USDOT, TRACS should consider:



Extent to which the recommendation improves safety in transit nationwide

- Potential to reduce fatalities
- Potential to reduce injuries
- Potential to reduce safety events
- Potential to improve system reliability



Extent to which the recommendation is feasible and practical

- Cost
- Availability of technology/approach nationwide
- Operational ease of use
- Upkeep/maintenance



Implementation of the recommendation under Safety Management Systems

- Safety management policy
- Safety promotion
- SRM
- Safety assurance

FTA may refocus research questions for the subcommittees' second tasks based on the findings from each subcommittee's first task.

The FTA Administrator or DFO may also form **Policy Support and Response** ad hoc subcommittees to facilitate consultation on emerging matters or to provide input on FTA safety policy activities. These taskings will be limited in scope, will occur over a short timeline, and will not require deviation from the work of the subcommittees.



### **Advancing Rider and Worker Safety**

#### Subcommittee:

Advancing Rider and Worker Safety

#### **Topics:**

- Transit rider and worker assault prevention
- Transit accessibility
- Transit rider and worker safety amid public health crises

#### Task 1:

Develop recommendations that define best practices to prevent rider and worker assaults and how FTA can support agencies in developing and implementing mitigations

Task 1 timeline: 1 year

#### Task 1 research questions:

- What best practice or low-cost solutions are agencies employing?
- How are agencies enhancing perceptions of rider/worker safety?
- What partnerships and actions have transit agencies used to address mental health and homelessness on their systems?
- How are agencies focusing on the safety of vulnerable populations?

#### **Proposed Task 2:**

Develop recommendations that define transit accessibility hazards, best practice mitigations, and how FTA can support safe and accessible transit

Task 2 timeline: 1 year, following Task 1

#### Task 2 research questions:

- How can safety mitigations that improve ADA accessibility be better incorporated in safety-related planning and operations decision-making?
- What research gaps regarding vulnerable populations, including pregnant women, can FTA fill?



### **Advancing Rider and Worker Safety**

- TRACS Report 14-01: Preventing and Mitigating Transit Worker Assaults in the Bus and Rail Transit Industry recommended that FTA:
  - Develop guidelines to implement protective infrastructure,
  - Develop guidelines for training and education to prevent assault, and
  - Conduct data collection and analysis on transit worker assaults and mitigating them.
- Since 2014, FTA has:
  - Issued <u>nine special directives</u> (22-14 to 22-22) to transit agencies to collect information on transit worker assault, and
  - Published <u>FTA Report 0211</u>: Analysis of Challenges Facing Pregnant Woman Riding Transit.
- FTA's Enhanced Transit Safety and Crime Prevention Initiative provides information and resources to help transit agencies protect transit workers and riders.
  - Includes video training options regarding assaults and violence against transit workers.

- Bus-to-POV collisions
- Mitigation best practices

#### Task 1:

Develop recommendations that define mitigations to prevent bus-to-person and bus-to-POV collisions

Task 1 timeline: 1 year

#### Task 1 research questions:

- What are the mitigations to bus collisions? How well are these mitigations known to the transit industry?
- How can FTA support partnerships (with the Federal Highway Administration, States, and transit agencies) to advance Vision Zero efforts, such as improving bus and station designs?

#### **Proposed Task 2:**

Define the barriers for agency implementation and determine how FTA can support agencies in implementing mitigations

Task 2 timeline: 1 year, following Task 1

#### Task 2 research questions:

- What are the barriers for agencies implementing mitigations to prevent bus collisions?
- What barriers to implementation are unique to urban or rural contexts?
- Other research questions will be determined based on Task 1 findings



### **Reducing Bus Collisions**

- The U.S. Department of Transportation's <u>National Roadway Safety Strategy</u> identified bicycle and pedestrian roadway fatalities as an increasing trend.
- The <u>2021 Bus Safety Data Report</u> found that bus collisions with pedestrian and POV's accounted for over 80 percent of bus transit safety event fatalities.
- FTA is currently assessing the safety risks of bus-to-person collisions in its SRM analysis, with a primary focus on bus and station designs.
  - TRACS will complement this analysis by further exploring possible mitigations,
    determining why agencies have not put currently-available mitigations in place, and
    recommending how FTA can support agencies in collision reduction.

### **Cyber and Data Security Systems**

#### Subcommittee:

Cyber and Data Security Systems

#### **Topics:**

- Hardening cyber and data security systems
- CAV, ITS, and future technology
- Cybersecurity for CAVs and ITS

#### **Task 1:**

Research and identify cybersecurity safety concerns for public transit agencies and recommend FTA actions and policies to mitigate those hazards

Task 1 timeline: 1 year

#### **Task 1 research questions:**

- What cybersecurity threats are relevant to transit agencies, and how are agencies responding?
- How can FTA differentiate its role in cybersecurity from that of the Department of Homeland Security to best support agencies?
- What risk mitigation practices can FTA relay to the industry?
- How can FTA support transit agency efforts to build programs?

#### Proposed Task 2:

Research and identify safety concerns regarding CAVs, ITS, and public transit interactions and recommend FTA actions and policies to mitigate those hazards

Task 2 timeline: 1 year, following Task 1

#### Task 2 research questions:

- What safety hazards do CAVs present for transit agencies?
- How are agencies employing ITS for their transit systems or responding to non-agency ITS?
- What are lessons learned from current CAV pilots (transit or transit-interacting) across the nation?



### **Cyber and Data Security Systems**

- In 2022, FTA <u>launched a website</u> with cybersecurity resources to help transit agencies prepare for, mitigate, and respond to cybersecurity issues.
- USDOT's Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS) Joint Program Office (JPO) <u>provides</u> guides for agencies to identify, protect against, respond to, and manage cybersecurity risks.
- ITS JPO also provides general resources to <u>accelerate ITS deployment</u> and <u>promote</u> <u>vehicle automation</u>.
  - These resources include multimodal tools, but are not specific to transit agencies.
- On November 30, 2022, the Transportation Security Administration <u>published an</u>
   <u>Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking</u> on enhancing cybersecurity risk
   management.




