Question 1:

Does the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law define maintenance personnel for purposes of the PTASP safety training program requirements?

Our agency has mechanics, facility workers, utility service workers, stop and station workers, administration, and road-call mechanics in the maintenance department.

FTA Response:

No, the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law does not define "maintenance personnel." For agencies that receive funds under 49 U.S.C. § 5307 and serve a large urbanized area (UZA) (a UZA with a population of 200,000 or more), the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law adds maintenance personnel as personnel that must participate in the agency's safety training program. It also requires the maintenance personnel, operations personnel, and personnel directly responsible for safety complete de-escalation training.

Question 2:

Do we need to include our de-escalation training materials in our ASP, or can we incorporate them by reference?

FTA Response:

You may choose to incorporate documents by reference in your ASP to demonstrate that you are meeting a Part 673 or Bipartisan Infrastructure Law requirement instead of including the documents directly in the ASP. Also note the ASP documentation and recordkeeping requirements at § 673.31.
