SUMMARY: The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) announces the selection of projects funded under the Fiscal Year (FY) 2024 Public Transportation on Indian Reservations Program, also known as the Tribal Transit Program (TTP), and provides administrative guidance on project implementation.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION: This program is authorized by Section 5311(c)(2) of Title 49, United States Code. Federal public transportation law (49 U.S.C. 5338(a)(2)(F) and (49 U.S.C. 5311(c)(1)(A), as amended by the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (Pub. L. 117–58, the "Bipartisan Infrastructure Law" or "BIL") authorized

\$9.2 million in FY 2024 for competitive allocations.

On August 15, 2024, FTA posted a simplified and streamlined Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) announcing the availability of \$9.2 million in competitive funding under the TTP. The NOFO stated that additional funds made available prior to project selections may be allocated to eligible projects. Unallocated prior year funding was identified, bringing the total available for allocation to \$9.6 million.

The NOFO included programmatic changes to the TTP based on FTA's consultation efforts with tribal governments and tribal leaders from 2023 to 2024. These changes included increasing the cap on planning grants from \$25,000 to \$50,000; no longer limiting which eligible tribes can apply for operating assistance; and not requiring a local match for any project funded through the Tribal Transit competitive program.

Eligible applicants included federally recognized Indian Tribes or Alaska Native Tribes, villages, groups, or communities as identified by the U.S. Department of the Interior (DOI) Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA). These program funds will provide financial assistance for capital, operating, and planning projects to support existing public transportation service or establish new public transportation services in Indian Country.

In response to the NOFO, FTA received 38 eligible project proposals from 38 tribes requesting \$17.5 million. Project proposals were evaluated based on each applicant's responsiveness to the program evaluation criteria outlined in the NOFO. FTA is funding 26 projects for 26 tribes, as shown in Table 1, for a total of \$9.6 million.

Tribal recipients selected for competitive funding should work with their FTA Regional Office to submit a grant application in FTA's Transit Award Management System (TrAMS) for the projects identified in the attached table to quickly obligate funds. Grant applications may only include eligible activities included in the original

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project application and identified for funding in the project description column of the project selections table. Funds must be used consistent with the competitive proposal and for the eligible purposes established in the NOFO and described in the FTA Circular <u>9040.1H</u>.

In some cases, the funding allocation amount is less than the proposer's total requested amount. Planning projects were capped at \$50,000. For other allocations less than the requested amount, the recipient should work with the Regional Office to reduce the scope or scale of the project to ensure that a complete phase or project is accomplished. Tribal recipients are reminded that program requirements can be found in the NOFO.

A discretionary project identification number has been assigned to each project for tracking purposes and must be used in the TrAMS application. Recipients with projects listed with multiple project identification numbers should contact their FTA Regional Office regarding grant application structure in TrAMS.

Selected projects are eligible to incur costs under pre-award authority no earlier than the date projects were publicly announced, January 13, 2025. Pre-award authority does not guarantee that project expenses incurred prior to the award of a grant will be eligible for reimbursement, as eligibility for reimbursement is contingent upon other requirements, such as planning and environmental requirements, having been met. Postaward reporting requirements include submission of the Federal Financial Report and

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Milestone Progress Reports in TrAMS as appropriate (see FTA Circulars <u>5010.1F</u> and <u>9040.1H</u>). Recipients must comply with all applicable Federal statutes, regulations, executive orders, FTA circulars, and other Federal requirements in carrying out the project supported by the FTA grant. FTA emphasizes that recipients must follow all third-party procurement guidance, as described in FTA Circular <u>4220.1F</u>. Funds allocated in this announcement must be obligated in a grant by September 30, 2027.

Grant funding made available through this program may be included in a Tribal Transportation Self-Governance funding agreement if there is an existing Self-Governance compact in place between the Tribe and the U.S. Department of Transportation. If funds are transferred to a Tribal Self-Governance funding agreement, the funds will be subject to the requirements and provisions of the Tribal Transportation Self-Governance Program regulation at 49 CFR part 29 and may be used only for the purpose for which they were awarded.
