

National Response Framework



- Guides the Nation's response to all types of disasters and emergencies
- Scalable, flexible, and adaptable
- Incorporates in the National Incident Management System (NIMS) concepts
- Describes specific authorities and best practices for managing all-hazard incidents



Response Applications

- Stafford Act
 - Authorizes FEMA to direct other federal agencies to use their available personnel, supplies, facilities, and other resources to provide assistance in the event of a emergency declaration or major disaster declaration by the President
- Other Declarations
 - A Governor or Mayor has declared an emergency and the Secretary of Transportation concurs




FTA Major Lesson Learned...

- After Hurricane Katrina, it became clear FTA needed a process for waiving requirements
- FTA developed an emergency relief docket process:
 - I. Existing regulations that permit exceptions in emergencies; e.g. Charter, Planning, NEPA, Procurement
 - 2. Requested by recipients through emergency relief docket
